Blast from the past: Press Enterprise, January 21, 1968

New Japanese-American group will install officers

Riverside's newly-formed chapter of the Japanese-American Citizens League will install its officers at a dinner in the Jade Palace, 4620 Holt boulevard, Montclair, on Feb. 3 at 6:30 p.m.

The Riverside chapter has about 30 members, representing about 180 families of Japanese descent in the Riverside-San Bernardino area.

GEN OGATA, a soil scientist at the U.S. Salinity Laboratory in Riverside, elected the chapter's first president, said the chapter has proposed a four-point program as a starter: youth activities; education; community relations — including programs to increase civic participation and service by citizens of Japanese descent; and fellowship, the social aspect of the organization.

Ogata said the organization of a youth activities program "seems to be the area of greatest need." He said many JACL members have teenaged children, and they note a lack of dances or other social activities at

which they can get together with others of their age group.

Ogata indicated a JACL chapter would fill a need for a community-wide organization representing people of Japanese ancestry. "We have a church and a woman's

"We have a church and a woman's club," he said, "but this — the JACL — has a little wider interest."

TWO LEADERS in organizing the chapter were William and Nancy Takano. Takano holds the office of hospitality chairman.

Another leader helpful in organizing, Ogata said, was Edwin Mitoma, vice president, who is a past president of the Washington, D.C., chapter of JACL. Mitoma is an electronics engineer with Aerospace in San Bernardino.

Other officers are: Miss Michiko Yoshimura, secretary: Mrs. Richard Higa, treasurer: Junji Kumamoto, program chairman; and Miss Sumi Harada, historian.


Our Condolences to the Family of Mitsuru Inaba

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
